TX-07 GRANTS NEWSLETTER

March 2025

Over the last four years, Congress passed and President Biden signed into law transformative legislation, including the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)*, the *Inflation Reduction Act*, the *CHIPS and Science Act*, the *PACT Act*, the *Bipartisan Safer Communities Act*, and more. Together with Congressional appropriations, these laws create investments in and opportunities for our communities and our future.

This monthly newsletter is intended to provide a guide to some of the funding opportunities to help ensure our community has access to the information needed to apply for these grants to address key priorities in Texas' Seventh Congressional District. President Trump's recent executive orders and actions have directed federal agencies to pause all grant programs under the *IIJA*, however, and other grant programs. This pause creates uncertainty about the timing and availability of funding for infrastructure projects, potentially impacting project planning and implementation timelines.

We want to share what we are seeing, and we also want to hear from you about the experiences you have had with grant funding and grant applications. Your insights into federal grant funding are important to us. Please take a moment to <u>share</u> your priorities, concerns, and how this pause on federal grants impacts you.

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Active Grant Opportunities

The following grants are active and available as of the publication of this newsletter.

The CHIPS and Science Act

- Public Wireless Supply Chain Innovation Fund Grant Program
 - Description: The Innovation Fund is an NTIA-administered competitive grant program that seeks to accelerate the development, deployment, and adoption of open and interoperable radio access networks (RAN). The NTIA will invest in software solutions to further drive Open RAN adoption.
 - Who can apply?
 - Entities that have received funding from past Innovation Fund grants are eligible to receive funds under this program if the entity otherwise meets the appropriate eligibility requirements defined in the NOFO.
 - o Deadline: March 17, 2025

The Inflation Reduction Act

- Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)
 - Description: This program protects the agricultural viability and related conservation values of eligible land by limiting nonagricultural uses which negatively affect agricultural uses and conservation values, protect grazing uses and related conservation values by restoring or conserving eligible grazing land, and protecting and restoring and enhancing wetlands on eligible land. There are two components of this program. First, Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) help private and tribal landowners, land trusts, and other entities such as state and local governments protect croplands and grasslands on working farms and ranches by limiting non-agricultural uses of the land through conservation easements. Second, Wetland Reserve Easements (WRE) help private and tribal landowners protect, restore, and enhance wetlands which have been previously degraded due to agricultural uses.
 - Who can apply?
 - Eligible partners include Native American Tribes; State and local governments; non-governmental organizations that have farmland, rangeland, or grassland protection programs. Eligible landowners include owners of privately held land, including land that is held by Tribes and Tribal members. All landowners, including required members of landowner-legal entities, must meet adjusted gross income (AGI) limitations and must be compliant with the HEL/WC provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985.
 - Deadline: Year-round

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Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

- Rural and Tribal Assistance Pilot Program
 - Description: Funding is available to support the planning and design phase of transportation projects in rural and Tribal communities. These grants can be used to hire staff or expert firms for technical, legal, or financial assistance. The goal is to advance transportation projects that are likely to qualify for select discretionary grant or credit programs offered by the U.S. Department of Transportation.
 - Who can apply?
 - State, county, city, or special district governments; and Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized).
 - o Deadline: April 3, 2025
- WaterSMART Aquatic Ecosystem Restoration Projects
 - Description: This program aims to support projects that study, design, and construct aquatic ecosystem restoration systems that are collaboratively developed, have widespread regional benefits, and result in an improvement to the health of fisheries, wildlife, and aquatic habitat through restoration or improved fish passage.
 - Who can apply?
 - States, Tribal governments, local authorities; irrigation or water districts; the members of which include one or more organizations with water or power delivery authorities.
 - Deadline: April 15, 2025
- Transformational Habitat Restoration and Coastal Resilience Grants
 - Description: NOAA aims to support transformational habitat restoration projects that restore marine, estuarine, coastal, or Great Lakes ecosystems using approaches that enhance community and ecosystem resilience to climate hazards.
 - Who can apply?
 - State, county, city, township, or special district governments; independent school districts; public and state controlled institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; small businesses; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than small businesses; Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized) and Native American Tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized Tribal governments).
 - o Deadline: April 16, 2025

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• Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Grant

- Description: This grant makes federal funds available for mitigation activities in response to the growing hazards associated with climate change and the need for natural hazard risk mitigation that promote climate adaptation and resilience.
- Who can apply?
 - County, city, or township governments; and Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized).
- o Deadline: April 18, 2025
- Carbon Utilization Procurement Grants
 - Description: UPGrants aims to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by demonstrating that various products can be replaced or supplemented with alternatives derived from anthropogenic carbon oxides. Public procurement incentives for carbon conversion products can stimulate a market for products with lower life-cycle CO2 emissions, calculated on a cradle to gate basis.
 - Who can apply?
 - State and local governments; public utility or agency; institutions of higher education; forprofit and nonprofit entities; and Tribal governments.
 - Deadline: April 30, 2025

• Port Infrastructure Development Program (PIDP)

- Description: This grants support efforts by ports and industry stakeholders to improve port and related freight infrastructure to meet the country's freight transportation needs and ensure our port infrastructure can meet anticipated growth in freight volumes. The PIDP provides funding to ports in both urban and rural areas for planning and capital projects.
- Who can apply?
 - States; political subdivision of a state or local government; public agency or publicly chartered authority established by one or more states; special purpose district with a transportation function; Tribal governments; and a multistate or multijurisdictional group of entities.
- Deadline: April 30, 2025

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- Pilot-Scale Rapid Operational Validation of Key Energy Infrastructure Technologies (PROVE IT)
 - Description: This program supports small businesses conducting research and development to validate pilot-scale units in real-world operational environments before commercialization. The program focuses on testing components or subsystems as part of a fully integrated system in industrial-relevant conditions. Successful proposals should address significant adoption challenges and demonstrate potential for major industry impact.
 - Who can apply?
 - To be eligible for the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program, a small business must be a for-profit entity, with a majority of its equity (more than 50%) owned by U.S. citizens or permanent residents.
 - o Deadline:
 - Fiscal Year 2025 Planning Application Due, March 7, 2025
 - Fiscal Year 2025 Full Application Due, June 2, 2025
- Bridge Investment Program, Planning and Bridge Program
 - Description: This grant program aims to reduce the overall number of bridges in poor condition and keep bridges in fair condition from deteriorating further. The program expands applicant eligibility which allows all levels of government to apply as direct recipients making it easier for local projects to advance the needs of the community.
 - Who can apply?
 - States and federal land management agencies; metropolitan planning organizations; local governments; and Tribal governments.
 - Deadlines:
 - Fiscal Year 2026 Planning Application Deadline, October 1, 2025
 - Fiscal Year 2026 Application Deadline, November 1, 2025

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Other Federal Grants for Diverse Needs

The following grants are active and available as of the publication of this newsletter.

• Statewide Family Network

- Description: The purpose of this program is to provide resources to enhance the capacity of statewide mental health family-controlled organizations to support, train, and mentor family members/primary caregivers who are raising children, youth, and young adults with serious emotional disturbance (SED) and/or co-occurring disorders (COD).
- Who can apply?
 - Domestic, public, and private nonprofit entities.
- Deadline: March 17, 2025
- Child Welfare and Domestic Violence Agency Collaborations to Support Families
 - Description: The purpose of this funding opportunity is to improve community response to incidents of domestic violence where a child is present. The goal of the program is to improve collaboration between child welfare and domestic violence agencies to ensure that families affected by domestic violence, with or at risk of involvement with the child welfare system, have timely access to trauma-informed, individualized services and resources that improve their safety and well-being.
 - Who can apply?
 - State, county, city, special district, or township governments; independent school districts; public, state, and private controlled institutions of higher education; public/Tribal housing authorities; small businesses; nonprofits other than institutions of higher education; forprofit organizations other than small businesses; and Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized).
 - o Deadline: March 21, 2025

Regional Telehealth Resource Centers

- Description: This funding allows recipients to provide expert and customized telehealth technical assistance across the country. These telehealth resource centers will provide training and support, disseminate information and research findings, promote effective collaboration, and foster the use of telehealth for underserved or rural areas.
- Who can apply?
 - State, county, city, special district or township governments; independent school districts; small businesses; forprofit organizations; nonprofits other than institutions of higher education; Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized).
- Deadline: April 14, 2025

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• **NEW** Partners for Fish and Wildlife (PFW)

- Description: This is a voluntary program that fosters partnerships to support both communities and the conservation of fish, wildlife, and their habitats. Through cooperative agreements with private landowners, the program offers technical assistance and financial support to restore and protect vital habitats, benefiting federal trust resources.
- Who can apply?
 - State, county, city, township, or special district governments; independent school districts; private, public and state controlled institutions of higher education; public housing authorities/Tribal housing authorities; small businesses; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Native American Tribal governments (Federally recognized) and organizations; Individuals
- o Deadline: September 30, 2025

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The following grants and funding opportunities are upcoming and are not yet accepting applications. As more details become available for each of these programs, our team will be sure to include them in upcoming issues of this newsletter. *Please note that these dates are target announcement dates, and therefore subject to change. Please also note some of these programs may be subject to change due to the current Administration's Executive Orders.*

Upcoming Notices and Funding Opportunities

- Reducing Truck Emissions at Port Facilities
 - Description: The Department of Transportation (DOT) will provide funding to reduce truck idling and emissions at ports, including through the advancement of port electrification. The DOT anticipates this new funding opportunity will be available for application through a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to be released in Spring of 2025.
- Electric Drive Vehicle Battery Improving Economics, Recovery and Reuse, and State of Health
 - Description: The Electric Drive Vehicle Battery Recycling and Second-Life Applications Program focuses on the research, development, and demonstration of second life uses for electric vehicle batteries after they have powered electric vehicles, as well as technologies and processes for their recycling and final disposal. The Department of Energy anticipates posting this funding opportunity soon.
- All Stations Accessibility Program
 - Description: The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) will provide funding to assist in the financing of capital projects to repair, improve, modify, retrofit, or relocate facility infrastructure to make all public areas of the station accessible to people with disabilities, including those who use wheelchairs. The FTA anticipates posting this funding opportunity in Spring of 2025.
- Safe Streets for All Program (SS4A)
 - Description: The Safe Streets and Roads for All program provides funding for regional, local, and Tribal initiatives aimed at preventing roadway deaths and injuries. This program supports the Department of Transportation's goal of zero roadway deaths through a Safe System Approach. The DOT anticipates posting this funding opportunity in Spring of 2025.
- Buses and Bus Facilities Competitive Grants; Low or No Emissions (Bus) Grants
 - Description: The FTA seeks to provide funding to state and local governments to purchase, lease, replace, or rehabilitate zero-emission and low-emission transit buses, as well as to acquire, construct, or lease supporting facilities. These programs support technological advancements and innovations to modernize transit systems, including modifications for low or no-emission vehicles and infrastructure. The FTA anticipates posting this funding opportunity in Spring of 2025.

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- Natural Gas Distribution Infrastructure Safety and Modernization (NGDISM)
 - Description: Through the NGDISM grant, the Department of Transportation (DOT) will provide funding to repair, rehabilitate, or replace natural gas distribution pipeline systems or portions thereof, or to acquire equipment to either reduce incidents and fatalities or avoid economic losses. This program aims to reduce the risk profile of existing pipeline systems with pipes prone to leakage of methane, create related well-paying jobs, promote economic growth, and benefit disadvantaged rural communities with the safe provision of natural gas. The DOT anticipates posting this funding opportunity in Spring of 2025.
- Head Start
 - Description: This program supports school readiness of young children from low-income families by providing comprehensive early childhood education, health, and family services. The Department of Health and Human Services anticipates posting this funding opportunity soon.
- **NEW** National Digital Newspaper Program
 - Description: This program creates a national digital resource of historically significant newspapers published between 1690 and 1963 from all 56 states and U.S. jurisdictions. The Library of Congress (LOC) maintains this freely accessible, searchable online database.
- NEW Seeding Critical Advances for Leading Energy Technologies with Untapped Potential (SCALEUP)
 - Description: This program supports research and development of innovative energy technologies that address key national security, environmental, and efficiency challenges. The funding aims to accelerate the transition from scientific discovery to early-stage technology with high-impact potential.
- **NEW** Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail (NEC)
 - The FSP Program offers federal funding to improve U.S. passenger rail infrastructure, addressing State of Good Repair backlogs, enhancing performance, and expanding intercity rail services, including privately operated services. It prioritizes sustaining longdistance routes to maintain national connectivity.
- NEW Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements
 - The purpose of the CRISI Program is to invest in a wide range of projects within the United States to improve railroad safety, efficiency, and reliability; mitigate congestion at both intercity passenger rail and freight rail chokepoints to support more efficient travel and goods movement; enhance multi-modal connections; and lead to new or substantially improved Intercity Passenger Rail Transportation corridors.
