Dear Secretary Burgum,

As Members of Congress representing communities impacted by orphaned oil and gas wells, we write to express our concern regarding the Department of the Interior's (DOI) pause on orphaned well remediation funding provided in the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA*).

As we are certain you know, inactive oil and gas wells with no known owner (orphaned wells) can pose a considerable threat to our communities' public health and environment. Without proper maintenance, these orphaned wells can lead to significant emissions of methane and other pollutants. The highest-emitting unplugged wells can release 76 kilograms (kgs) of methane per hour, a rate equivalent to the greenhouse gas emissions of 4,000 gasoline-powered cars annually. Orphaned wells can also lead to significant groundwater contamination and other dangers. 14 million Americans live within one mile of an orphaned well, creating a serious public health risk ²

According to the Interstate Oil & Gas Compact Commission, there are more than 141,000 documented orphaned oil and gas wells on state and private land and an estimated 250,000-740,000 undocumented orphaned wells around the country.³ DOI has also identified more than 16,000 orphaned wells on federal land.⁴

To address this issue, Congress authorized more than \$4.6 billion of funding for DOI in the *IIJA* to administer orphaned well plugging, remediation, and restoration programming. This program represents years of bipartisan work on this issue, including the bipartisan *Revive Economic Growth and Reclaim Orphaned Wells Act*, which was included in the *IIJA*. As of June 2024, more than 9,000 orphaned wells were plugged across state, private, and federal lands with *IIJA* funds.⁵ We have heard from state agencies administering these funds that the scale and reliability of this funding for this purpose has been transformational in this work.

On January 20, 2025, President Trump issued an executive order titled "Unleashing American Energy" that directed agencies to pause distribution of *IIJA* funding.⁶ Your Order 3418 on February 3, 2025, directing your Assistant Secretary for Policy, Management, and Budget to determine how to issue *IIJA* funding in accordance with President Trump's priorities.⁷ To date, we have seen no clear, public guidance from DOI regarding the implementation of paused *IIJA* funding.

As of September 2024, \$3.4 billion in *IIJA* funding remained available for orphaned well remediation.⁸ This funding represents thousands of jobs for people who work in the oil and gas industry. In fiscal year 2024 alone, DOI's *IIJA* orphaned well obligations supported more than 6,000 jobs and contributed \$861 million to the economy (an approximate 140% return on investment rate).⁹ This program has also led to many workforce development initiatives and partnerships, creating new opportunities in high-paying careers. Communities where well remediation service providers are based also benefit from increased demand for supporting industries like contract materials, food services, and lodging.¹⁰ Pausing this funding with no clear guidance for impacted parties will harm our economies and the skilled energy workers whose jobs depend on DOI maintaining a dependable and transparent process. We have already begun to hear from *IIJA* funding recipients impacted by this pause who now face an uncertain future after DOI issued a stop work order on their orphaned well remediation projects.

DOI's Orphaned Wells Program Office's own strategic plan for fiscal years 2025-2030 includes an objective to "build effective, efficient, and collaborative partnerships" with funding
